“Brexit”

In the lead-up to the referendum on whether the UK will leave the European Union on 23 June 2016, opinion on the benefits and disadvantages of an exit is divided.

A French survey, published on 20 April 2016, conducted across five EU countries found that most of the Europeans interviewed prefer for the UK to remain an EU member.

During a recent visit to the UK, US president Barack Obama stated that “Brexit” campaigners were incorrect to suggest if Britain left the EU it would be straightforward to agree a new trade relationship, and that it could take up to a decade for an agreement with the UK alone. He also stressed that the first priority for the US would be to complete ongoing talks on a trade deal with the EU.

Other information pointing to difficulties in the case of the UK leaving the EU was presented by British Finance Minister George Osborne on 18 April in a report to the Treasury which found that Britain would be worse off by £4,300 a year per household if the country voted to leave the European Union.

Despite the possibility of adverse economic impacts on the UK, though, recent polls indicate that the referendum will be extremely close.

There are expectations that government could be formed early in May after weeks of negotiations if acting Prime Minister Enda Kenny manages to secure the support of a number of independents. Fianna Fail and Fine Gael, Ireland's two major parties, reached an agreement which facilitates a minority government led by Fine Gael until 2018 but the support of six independents is required.

Migrants to the EU

A recent Eurostat report provided the following statistical information on migrations to Europe in 2015:

The 28 Member States of the EU granted protection status to 333 350 asylum seekers in 2015, an increase of 72% compared with 2014. Since 2008, a total of nearly 1.1 million asylum seekers have been granted protection status in the EU.

The largest group of beneficiaries of protection status in the EU in 2015 remained citizens of Syria (166 100 persons, or 50% of the total number of persons granted protection status in the EU Member States), followed by citizens of Eritrea (27 600 or 8%) and those of Iraq (23 700 or 7%).

Frontex reported in April that the number of migrants arriving in Greece dropped in March due to the implementation of the EU-Turkey agreement, coupled with stricter border policies applied by the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia at its border with Greece and the new NATO operation in the Aegean. All of these measures are considered to have led to a noticeable reduction in the number of migrants arriving on the Greek islands in March. The total number of migrants detected crossing the EU's external borders in the Eastern Mediterranean for the entire month of March reached 26 460; this is less than half the figure recorded for February.

On 19 April the Commissioner for European Neighbourhood Policy and Enlargement, Johannes Hahn, announced additional funding for the facility for refugees in Turkey.

Migration and asylum also featured on the agenda of the 21 April meeting of the home affairs ministers of the European Union in Luxembourg. Topics discussed included actions to reduce the negative humanitarian consequences of the current migratory situation, protect EU external borders, stem the flows, reduce illegal migration and safeguard the integrity of the Schengen area. The meeting also reaffirmed the need to accelerate the implementation of the EU-Turkey statement of 18 March and in particular the resettlement of Syrian refugees from Turkey in the framework of the 1:1 scheme. Member states were also invited to accelerate the relocation of asylum seekers from Greece and Italy, according to the Council decisions of September 2015. There was also agreement to continue to monitor the possible opening up of new migratory routes, especially the Central Mediterranean, in order to avoid a major crisis.

The Union's Institutional and Constitutional Transformations: Stress or Adaptation?—8th Pan-European Conference on the European Union (SGEU)

The European Union has been undergoing momentous periods of stress due to both internal (Euro, EMU) and external (Libya, Ukraine, refugee) crises. Reactions to these crises have been differentiated, ranging from significant institutional and constitutional transformation to piecemeal adaptation. While the management of the Euro-crisis, the further strengthening of the EMU and, to some extent, surreptitious progress towards a budgetary and fiscal Union have been characterized by landmark decisions which have transformed the institutional and perhaps also the constitutional complexion of the Union, in foreign matters innovations have been less apparent and less dramatic and have mostly occurred along conventional tracks.

In and of itself this is nothing new. The life of the EU has been characterized by a marked lopsidedness between powerful internal structuring and weak external engagement. However, never before has this unevenness been more pronounced. While significant sacrifices of sovereignty are requested of Euro-zone member states in terms of their budgetary decisions (and procedures), their mid-term macroeconomic objectives and their planned structural reforms, in foreign and security matters member states cling to, and possibly even claim back, shares of Westphalian sovereignty. Can these two opposed lines of development proceed any further without causing significant tensions and stress in the entire EU edifice? Can two equally significant aspects of state sovereignty and liberal democracy - the domestic and the foreign - be governed by such disparate institutional arrangements? Will the Union eventually reconceptualise these two spheres or will they be driven further and further apart by dynamics that differentiate it into core and peripheral circles? And can internal regulatory and structural policies alone hold the European project together?
