Ambassador Fabrizi addresses Foreign Relations Committee of the Australian Parliament

On 11 February Ambassador Sem Fabrizi, Head of the European Union Delegation to Australia, addressed the Joint Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs, Defence and Trade at Parliament House in Canberra. His speech focused on three aspects:

- the state of the European Union
- the state of the EU-Australia relationship
- global challenges and the EU's role

He characterised the Australia-EU relations as strong, deep and broad stretching beyond trade and economic links to policies in a number of important areas such as foreign affairs and security, cooperation in the Pacific, the environment, climate change, development aid, research and education, and others. His speech addressed the importance of 2014 in the Australia-EU relationship: political visits, G20 Summit in Brisbane, ASEM Summit in Milan, the agreement on delegated cooperation, commemoration for WWI, and the 20th anniversary of the Research and Innovation Agreement.

An important item on the ambitious 2015 agenda was the call for a formalisation of the relationship through ratification of the so-called Framework Agreement.

Horizon 2020, the new EU Research and Innovation program, is a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. Funding is based on competitive calls open to everyone, also to organisations/individuals outside the EU. Participants

from countries associated to the EU research framework program have the same rights as EU participants; for other countries, the situation varies. Funding in the 2014 budget is focused on the three key pillars of Horizon 2020:

- Excellent Science: Around €3 billion, including €1.7 billion for grants from the European Research Council for top scientists and €800 million for Marie Skłodowska-Curie fellowships for younger researchers (see MEMO/13/1123).
- Industrial Leadership: €1.8 billion to support Europe's industrial leadership in areas like ICT, nanotechnologies, advanced manufacturing, robotics, biotechnologies and space.
- Societal challenges: €2.8 billion for innovative projects addressing Horizon 2020's seven societal challenges, broadly: health; agriculture, maritime and bioeconomy; energy; transport; climate action, environment, resource efficiency and raw materials; reflective societies; and security.
