EU Ambassador to Australia launches Climate exhibition 'Ice Texts' at the National Arboretum

As part of the celebration of Europe Day on 8 May 2015, the Ambassador of the European Union to Australia, H.E. Sem Fabrizi, launched the exhibition 'Ice Texts' in the presence of its creator, David Buckland.

The EU, its Member States as well as 167 other countries including Australia are committed to adopting an international agreement in Paris in December 2015 to achieve the goal of containing global temperature rise to below 2°C. As part of its strategy, the EU committed in March 2015 to reduce its greenhouse gas emissions by at least 40 per cent by 2030.

EU Australia's largest source of foreign investment

The Australian Bureau of Statistics released data on 8 May revealing that total EU investment stocks in Australia had risen by eleven per cent to \$A951.8 billion last calendar year. This equated to 34 per cent of total foreign investment in Australia, exceeding the United States' \$A720.3 billion and Japan's \$A174.4 billion, as well as being almost 15 times larger than China's \$A64.5 billion.

Launch of the European Agenda on Migration

On 13 May the European Commission launched the European Agenda on Migration, having set out a suite of comprehensive actions regarding funding, rebalancing, and furthering the migration plans in place.

Two days prior to the launch, on May 11, the EU High Representative for Foreign and Security Policy, Federica Mogherini, in New York to work with United Nations to address the problem, had advised the United Nations Security Council a global approach was required to deal with the humanitarian dimension as well as the security dimension of the migration crisis in the Mediterranean.

40 years of EU – China relations

During her recent visit to China at the beginning of May, Federica Mogherini, the High Representative of the European External Action Service and Vice President of the European Commission drew attention to the long-standing close ties between the EU and China: "*The EU and China are celebrating 40 years of strong relations,*" HRVP Mogherini stated.

HRVP Mogherini met with Chinese Premier Li Keqiang as well as the Minister in charge of the International Department of the Central Committee of the Party, Mr Wang Jiarui, and China's Minister for Foreign Affairs, Mr Wang Yi. She also co-chaired the 5th EU-China Strategic dialogue with State Councillor Yang Jiechi. Topics of discussion included preparations for the upcoming EU-China summit and areas of greater cooperation. Also discussed were major global issues such as climate change and an agreement to work together more closely in the lead up to the climate change conference in Paris.

Greece

Amid heightened fears that Greece would be likely to default on its June IMF repayments, followed by an exit from the Eurozone—which according to a survey is not the preferred option of the Greek population—European Commission President Jean-Claude Juncker is reported to have been critical of Greek Finance Minister Gianis Varoufakis.

Conservative Party wins an absolute majority in the UK general elections—EU Referendum considerations

In a surprise election win, the Conservative Party won 36.9 per cent of the vote and with 331 seats (+24 in comparison with the previous elections on 6th May 2010), it took the absolute majority in the House of Commons. Labour which won 30.4% of the vote and 232 seats (-26) recorded their lowest result in 28 years.

Following the Conservative Party's victory the UK's relations with EU, or indeed a possible exit, have now become the focus of political debate. In 2013 David Cameron promised a referendum on the exit of his country from the European Union by 2017 if he was re-elected. This referendum is now firmly on the parliamentary agenda. Opening parliament on May 27, the Queen announced introduction of early legislation to enable a vote to take place as well as measures to renegotiate the UK's place in the EU.

However, investors and the financial markets while happy with the Conservative victory have already expressed their fears about the damaging effects that a referendum on the country's future in the European Union might have on the economy. Moreover, even if the referendum Bill passes the House of Commons, it might face problems in the House of Lords.

It has been indicated that Cameron may face strong opposition in the House of Lords where the Conservatives are outnumbered. It has been reported that peers are

likely to seek to alter the referendum question, the timing of the vote, and the electorate who will be eligible to participate.

Mr Cameron will be visiting major European cities including Berlin, Paris, Warsaw and Rome as part of his bid to negotiate better terms for Britain's membership of the EU, before putting a new deal to voters in a referendum by the end of 2017.

Julius Stone Address 2015—The end of war: how the most reviled treaty of all time changed the world

Speaker: Scott Shapiro, Charles F. Southmayd Professor of Law and Professor of Philosophy, Yale Law School

Critics of international law frequently cite the Kellogg-Briand Pact of 1928 as clear evidence of its folly. That the Great Powers attempted to rid the world of war by means of a piece of paper is taken as a sign of the naive idealism that has discredited international law for so many. In this lecture, Scott Shapiro takes issue with this sceptical view by arguing that the Kellogg-Briand pact inaugurated a revolution in our thinking about war. The treaty has, in fact, been so successful that we no longer remember the world before it, when war was a well-established legal institution and, thus, a legitimate method for enforcing rights and resolving disputes. Shapiro attempts to recover this once dominant but now-forgotten conception of war by returning to its first formulation by Hugo Grotius and the strange confluence of events that led to its creation.

Horizon 2020

Closing date: project dependent

Horizon 2020, the new EU Research and Innovation program, is a Europe 2020 flagship initiative aimed at securing Europe's global competitiveness. Funding is based on competitive calls open to everyone, also to organisations/individuals outside the EU. Participants from countries associated to the EU research framework program have the same rights as EU participants; for other countries, the situation varies. Funding in the 2014 budget is focused on the three key pillars of Horizon 2020:

- Excellent Science: Around €3 billion, including €1.7 billion for grants from the European Research Council for top scientists and €800 million for Marie Skłodowska-Curie fellowships for younger researchers (see MEMO/13/1123).
- Industrial Leadership: €1.8 billion to support Europe's industrial leadership in areas like ICT, nanotechnologies, advanced manufacturing, robotics, biotechnologies and space.
- Societal challenges: €2.8 billion for innovative projects addressing Horizon 2020's seven societal challenges, broadly: health; agriculture, maritime and bio economy; energy; transport; climate action, environment, resource efficiency and raw materials; reflective societies; and security.
